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

Hands Across The Sand

RESIDENTS, VISITORS, AND COMMUNITY LEADERS JOIN HANDS AND STAND UNITED AGAINST OFFSHORE DRILLING

There are currently more than 120 East Coast municipalities, more than 1,200 elected officials, and an alliance representing more than 41,000 businesses and 500,000 fishing families who have publicly opposed offshore drilling activities. Despite the overwhelming opposition, in late April, President Donald Trump signed an executive order that requires a review of the five-year program for oil and gas development on the Outer Continental Shelf (from 2017-2022).

"It is very concerning that the new administration is willing to completely disregard citizens' and local communities' input into the federal offshore drilling plan so that they can pursue their own predetermined agenda," said Chris Carnevale of the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy (SACE) who last month helped organize Hands Across the Sand on Folly Beach, where hundreds gathered on at first block on Folly's east side to join hands opposing offshore drilling in the Folly Beach community.

"The current federal offshore drilling plan was just finalized in January 2017 after more than two years of thorough analysis by the Department of the Interior, thoughtfully gathering comments from citizens, elected officials, businesses, and the military, and evaluating the appropriateness of offshore drilling in certain areas in the context of those opinions," says Carnevale. "The new administration came in and said they are going to throw all of that work out the window and start again, which to me sounds like they are just fine with ignoring citizens, communities, and small businesses in order to grant favors to Big Oil."

President Trump's newly signed order also directs the administration to streamline the permitting process for seismic airgun blasting, an extremely loud and dangerous process used to search for oil and gas deposits deep below the ocean's surface, but can be devastating to marine life and the commercial fishing industry in a region. In some areas



where seismic airgun blasting has occurred, there has been a decline in commercial fishing catches by 40-80 percent for thousands of miles, according to Oceana, the largest international advocacy organization dedicated solely to ocean conservation.

In addition to being devastating for marine life, seismic airguns are the first step toward dangerous and dirty offshore drilling with associated habitat destruction, potential oil spills, and contribution to climate change and ocean acidification.

The Hands Across the Sand event held Saturday, May 20 on Folly Beach was not the first Hands Across the Sand event held here, but this year's gathering had a bit of a different feel.

"This year's event had a little bit different of a focus than last year's event. Last year, we were celebrating as a community that President Obama had canceled his misguided plan to drill for oil in the Atlantic," said Carnevale. "This year, we had to come together to fight against President Trump's brand new proposal for Atlantic drilling, which on its face is likely more threatening than President Obama's plan. We had great attendance at this year's event, even larger than last year, and we were joined

by some inspiring elected official VIPs."

Among the local politicians in attendance were City of Folly Beach mayor Tim Goodwin, Town of James Island mayor Bill Woolsey, and Edisto Beach mayor Jane Energy. Also in attendance were representatives from the Surfrider Foundation, South Carolina Coastal Conservation League, Charleston Waterkeeper, and Citizens Climate Lobby.

"The most encouraging thing to see at this year's event was how strongly the event participants rallied behind the elected officials who are taking a stand on this issue, like Mayor Tim Goodwin and Congressman Mark Sanford," said Carnevale. "We need elected officials at all levels to stand up for protecting the coast and in turn citizens will stand up for them."

Carnevale says there are things you can do if you want to get involved. "Everyone who loves to live here for the beach and the marsh should do these three things: 1.) sign the pledge to protect our coast at <http://bit.ly/protectourcoast>; 2) call Governor McMaster and thank him for his opposition to offshore drilling (803.734.2100); 3) call Senators Graham (843-849-3887) and Scott (843-727-4525) and ask them to oppose offshore drilling in the Atlantic. Our coast depends on it!"

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Summertime Size Up

FOLLOW THE RULES AND HAVE FUN

If The City of Folly Beach had to inform only the approximately 2,400-year around residents of the beach and parking rules, the challenge to spread the word would be small, like the size of flip-flop. It no time, everyone would know the rules.

For Folly Beach – our Public Safety, The City, and the residents – it’s a nonstop education because there is a constant flux of new guests arriving.

For visitors and residents alike, here’s a brief rundown on beach and parking rules for Folly Beach. Please help spread the word.

Paid parking is available at every beach access and the parking on Center Street is free. If people take a chance in the Right of Way (ROW), they have to know the rules, which include:

- No parking on the road. All four tires must be off the pavement.
- No parking on sidewalks.
- No blocking public or private driveways.
- No parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant.
- No parking in a crosswalk.
- No stopping, standing, or parking in a roadway.
- All parking must be parallel to the roadway. No diagonal parking unless posted.
- No parking on dunes or revetments.
- No parking against traffic. All vehicles must park with the flow of traffic.
- No parking in handicapped spaces unless visible handicapped license tag or visible permit on vehicle.
- No parking within 20 feet of an intersection.
- No parking on yellow curbs or within areas marked by yellow street lines.
- No parking behind yellow lines.

Folly also has several beach and animal policies in place to help everyone be safe and enjoy the sun and sand:

- Dogs are not allowed on the beach from 10 a.m. – 6 p.m. from May 1 to Sept. 30. Otherwise, dogs must always be leashed. No dogs allowed on the pier or the lighthouse inlet. Please pick up after your animal.
- Glass and alcohol is prohibited at all times on the beach.
- No plastic, balloons or Styrofoam are allowed.
- Fireworks or open fires are prohibited.
- Surfing without a leash is not allowed. From May 15 to Sept 15, no surfing in the “swim zone” from 2nd East to 3rd West.
- Stay off sand dunes.
- Do not interfere with sea turtles. Make sure lights along the beach are turned off at dusk.

Finally, please do not litter. You wouldn’t even think it needs mentioning, but every morning, beach patrol hauls so much garbage off the beach, it’s enough to make you cry.

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The Great Folly Art Caper

20-FOOT MURAL STOLEN FROM UNDERNEATH MCKEVLIN'S SURF SHOP

Whether they realize it or not, most people on Folly Beach are familiar with the artwork of Chris Kemp. His girlfriend jokes and says he's the "Banksy of Folly." Not only has he done designs for Bert's Market, McKevin's Surf Shop, Chico Feo, and Flipper Finders, he also did the logos for the Folly Farmers Market, Folly Green Team, and Warrior Surf Foundation. Additionally, Kemp is the official illustrator for *The Folly Current*. He has done close to a dozen covers for the paper.

The fact that Kemp's work is so identified with Folly Beach, and beloved by those who live and visit here, makes it that much more upsetting to hear that a large mural he created was stolen recently from underneath McKevin's Surf Shop where he also works.

According to Kemp, it seems to have been stolen late at night on Tuesday, May 23 or early morning on Wednesday, May 24. Another employee at McKevin's noticed it was gone that Wednesday morning.

From the corner of Center Street and East Ashley Avenue where McKevin's is located,

you can easily see the building where Folly Beach Public Safety is housed. Making the brazen theft even harder to comprehend is that the painting is 20 feet long by four feet high. Certainly not just something someone could stuff under their shirt and run with down the street. Yet, there are not cameras on that side of McKevin's and no one has reported seeing anyone messing with the large painting.

"How did you pull that off without anyone seeing? And why?" asks Kemp. "I would think if you had a liking for the art, you would just ask for a commission. But, apparently not."

The mural was originally painted back in the summer of 2014 when Kemp first moved to Charleston. He was working at McKevin's part-time and when the shop sponsored a surf movie event on the beach at Tides, he painted it live in front of the crowd. After the event the mural was attached to the bottom of McKevin's, where it has served as a bit of a landmark over the last three years.

"I posted something about it (on Facebook)

when I found out. I was pretty shocked at how many people were upset it was gone. But it feels good to know that people appreciate art in their community and it holds a place with them," says Kemp. "Quite a few people sent me photos they had taken of their dog or child posing in front of the mural."

In November of 2016 Kemp felt he had grown a lot as an artist in the two years since he had originally painted the mural, so he freshen it up a bit. "I repainted the surf goons with a lot more color and have kept adding more periodically since," he says.

Kemp refers to the characters in the mural affectionately as "surf goons" because the painting features a colorful array of different surfers from every walk of life. "The inspiration is that all sorts of people surf these days, riding all sorts of boards as well. The diversity in the culture, design, and aesthetic of surfing as a whole is at a point with many perspectives," he says. "The simple act of riding waves brings joy to many, and the mural was to exemplify that

and how McKevin's Surf Shop has brought a community of all different people together with one common interest."

Never having a piece of art stolen before, Kemp is keeping a positive attitude about the whole thing, posting on Facebook that he was "humbled" that someone liked his work enough to steal it. "I'm not sure whether to be upset or flattered that the piece is gone. Either way, it was a selfish act," he says.

While he's hoping that the highly recognizable piece of art somehow makes its way back to its home at McKevin's, he is already planning to replace it with something bigger and better soon. "I like that our funky community has a place for my art and people appreciate it," says Kemp. "Especially having a home at the surf shop that I take pride in being a part of. I'm not sure what yet, but you'll see it when it's there."

McKevin's owner Tim McKevin has offered to give away a free surfboard as a reward for the return of the mural.

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
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
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At that point, 40-year-old Subject #2 entered the room. The officer detained the man, and identified him as a 19-year-old from Goose Creek, who admitted he thought about stealing a shirt, but decided not to and left. The store clerk identified the man as the suspect. She also said she had witnessed the man drop the tags and anti-theft device on the floor, and stuff a shirt in his pants. She confronted the suspect about the theft. The man pulled the shirt out of his pants and handed it to her. Before walking out of the store, he told her, "I do what I want." The suspect was arrested, charged with theft, and taken to jail.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 3
FOLLY BEACH INTRIGUE

The R/O was dispatched to The Tides hotel around noon in reference to a case of stolen property. Upon arrival, the officer met with the 32-year-old male victim who said a 32-year-old woman had taken without permission his 2005 BMW 325ci sometime early that morning. He also claimed the woman had stolen \$1,500 from him. The man said the woman did not have permission to drive

his car, and he wanted to press charges. The victim said he had tried several times to contact the woman, but the suspect had blocked his phone number and his Facebook account. The investigation continues.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 3
JANSPORT REMAINS POPULAR

A 20-year-old man came to Public Safety headquarters around 1:30 p.m. to report a stolen backpack. The man said he had brought the bag to the beach on April 24, and sometime during the day, the bag, containing his military ID, debit card, a pair of shorts, a t-shirt, a football, and a baseball glove, went missing. The debit card had been used, charged for \$1.37, but he had called the bank and cancelled the card. The victim said he wasn't concerned about the missing property, but needed a police report to replace his military ID.

THURSDAY, MAY 4
STOLE THE TRUCK, LEFT THE DOG


The R/O was dispatched to the Kangaroo gas station around 1:45 a.m. in reference to a Stolen Vehicle. Upon arrival, he met with a 30-year-old North Carolina man who said he had left his 2006 Chevy Silverado with his dog in the back at a parking lot off Center Street, and when he returned, he found the dog wandering around and the truck missing. The man said he was upset about the incident and had started drinking outside the store to try and cope. During the interview, the officer noticed the man had some cuts on his head, forearms and legs, and what appeared to be airbag particles on his face. The officer contacted dispatch to see if anyone had located a crashed truck. Moments later, word came back that the truck in question had indeed been located off of Center Street crashed into a light pole and totaled. No arrests were made and the case remains open.

SATURDAY, MAY 6
A SPECIAL THANKS FROM OUR VETERANS

The 64-year-old male complainant walked into Public Safety headquarters around 8:30 a.m. to report his golf cart had been stolen. The man said his cart was missing from his West Cooper residence sometime the previous evening. The R/O accompanied the complainant to his home to investigate. There, the R/O got a call from dispatch stating the cart in question had been located near The Washout. Another officer came over the radio at that time saying he had come upon a 23-year-old male the night before driving the same golf cart. At that time, the officer had discussed driving a golf cart at night with the subject, and had given the man a courtesy ride from The Washout to an East Ashley residence. Contact was made with the subject who admitted he stole the golf cart for a joy ride. He said he was intoxicated at the time and had made a stupid mistake. 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A Pain in the Foot

LOCAL SURFER BECOMES SOUTH CAROLINA'S FIRST SHARK BITE VICTIM OF 2017

Local surfer and entrepreneur Holly Dyer is the owner of Veg Out, a food preparation and delivery service on James Island that creates meatless meal options for busy people. Dyer, 33, describes herself as "mostly vegetarian," but does eat seafood every once in a while. She said she became a pescaterian at the age of 14 and hasn't looked back. So it was a little ironic that someone, who only occasionally sinks her teeth into fish, had a fish sink its teeth into her a couple weeks ago.

Lucky for her the shark apparently didn't like the way she tasted and let her go but not before clamping down hard on her left foot while she was surfing at the Washout on Folly Beach.

Dyer has the dubious distinction of being the state's first in 2017. According to her, it's believed that it was probably a black tip or a bull shark that bit her foot, leaving several deep lacerations with a bite diameter of about 5 inches.

Around 11 a.m. on Saturday, April 29 Dyer was on her longboard waiting to

catch a wave when she said she saw the shark, probably about 4-5 feet long, come up from underneath her. "I was looking down at the water right near my foot when I saw the eye come up from under my board. I didn't have time to react and it bit me. It released and I paddled to shore," said Dyer, who has been surfing for 20 years. "I hadn't noticed any fish jumping or fin spotting prior to the bite. The water was clear and green that day and the sun was shining."

Dyer described the attack as the best, worst case scenario as she was able to escape with minor injuries, which sidelined her from her business for a little while and put a damper on her summer surfing plans ... at least for now.

"I am healed physically and emotionally it will take time," said Dyer. "I will be back in the water very soon! I'll be wearing my donated Sharkbandz to keep my chances down. Ha!" Sharkbandz are magnetic shark deterrent bands for surfers, divers, swimmers, and beach-goers designed to

repel sharks and shield you against shark attacks.

There are almost 40 species of sharks indigenous to South Carolina. Yet, shark attacks are still relatively rare. Last year there were only two reported shark attacks in the entire state. Since 1837, there have only been 82 shark attacks and two fatalities in South Carolina waters.

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Shrimp Season is Looking Good

DNR PREDICTS A FAVORABLE FORECAST FOR 2017 SHRIMP SEASON

America's favorite seafood is back in season at South Carolina docks and markets.

Commercial shrimp trawling opened in all legal South Carolina waters on Wednesday, May 24, and South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) biologists are optimistic about the coming season.

"So far we've seen indications that it should be a good year," said Mel Bell, director of SCDNR's Office of Fisheries Management. "Of course, after establishing the opening date, based on the condition of the resource, we have no control over how things will go. The success of the season will be up to the hard work of the fishermen and the environmental conditions they encounter throughout the year."

The present season comes on the heels of an unusual year. The 2016 shrimp season was preceded by a record fall flooding event, bookended by two abnormally warm winters, and included multiple tropical systems, including Hurricane Matthew. SCDNR models predicted high shrimp numbers in the spring, but ultimately the 2016 commercial harvest and value were on par with the ten-year averages – commercial trawlers harvested just shy of two million pounds (measured



heads-off) with a \$7.8 million dockside value. By comparison, shrimpers netted a little more than two million pounds of shrimp worth more than \$8.5 million in 2015.

Shrimp season normally opens in full in mid-to late-May, sometimes after the opening of eight smaller provisional areas in the state's outer waters. This year those provisional areas opened on April 20, allowing shrimpers to begin harvesting while still protecting most of the spawning population closer to shore.

The opening date for shrimp season changes from year-to-year based on the conditions of the shrimp themselves.

"It all depends on what the shrimp are doing – numbers, growth, and development," Bell said. SCDNR biologists head out aboard both commercial and agency vessels to study and sample the crustaceans, and one of the things they're looking for is evidence that a majority of female white shrimp have already spawned. Opening the season too soon – and

allowing trawlers to catch females that are still carrying eggs – could reduce the size of the fall white shrimp crop, which are the offspring of the spring white shrimp.

"The results of our recent surveys are encouraging for another good spring roe crop," said wildlife biologist Jeff Brunson. "In April we caught over two times as many shrimp on our sampling trips as the 10-year average, and the size of the shrimp was fairly typical for this time of year."

South Carolina's commercial shrimp calendar has three peak periods. In the spring, shrimpers capitalize on the influx of roe white shrimp, large, early-season shrimp that generally fetch higher prices and generate the most value for fishing effort. The summer months are defined by a peak in brown shrimp, which are similar to white shrimp in size and taste. In the fall and into winter, shrimpers once again bring white shrimp to the docks – this time the offspring of the spring roe shrimp.

"We hope the early-season forecasts translate into a successful year and encourage folks to get out and support the local industry," said Bell.


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ROOFTOP BAR AT SNAPPER EXPECTED TO REOPEN SOON



THERE'S SOMETHING STRANGE IN MY BEER

It seems these days every beer you pick up is brewed with something besides water, yeast, hops and malt. Without going down the road of "where have all the classic styles of beer gone," you would be hard pressed to visit your local pub and not find at least one bottle of some fruit, herb, spice or vegetable brewed beverage in the cooler, if not on tap. Not to say that adding any of these adjuncts, or the essence of them is new to the brewing world; it is not. Belgian brewers especially have been adding all types of things to their beer for ages.

However, it seems that every mid-major brewing company in this country has a fruit or vegetable, herb or spice something beer in their line up. And, I must be honest; these types of beers are a mixed bag. While I have sampled some of the finest 'beers with additions' in the land, most that make use of fruit or vegetables in the brewing process are far from stellar, and should be picky about venturing down this road.

I have no interest in listing the many (MANY) fruit and vegetable beers that you should avoid. Literally, there are too many to mention. With the new trend toward farm to brewery, there are numerous great breweries using herbs and spices, fruits and vegetables in their beers. Think of Fonta Flora in North Carolina and Lazy Magnolia in Mississippi, just two who do this well. But many are just plain bad.

That said there is at least one brewery that tends to get it right – Dogfish Head. Masters at using fruit, vegetables, spices and herbs, DFH has some of the most wonderful creations in the realm. And, while some of their strange concoctions fail, most are quite delicious, due to a tendency to only allow for the essence of the addition to shine through, and not to devastate the underlying beer.

One of my all-time favorite beers over the years is Punkin Ale. I have said before that this is the best example of a pumpkin beer on the market. The seasonals Black & Blue (a Belgian ale with blackberries and blueberries) and Red & White (a Wit made with Pinot Noir juice) are both excellent.

Piercing Pils is a gem of a little lager, more specifically a Czech Pilsner. Saaz hops stand out, expected for this style, but what pushes this beer beyond the standard pils crowd is the addition of white pear tea and pear juice. It's not a perry (pear cider), but hints of the succulent fruit hit on the tongue and sides of the mouth.

But, more importantly for the summer months, Dogfish Head Craft Brewery offers Aprihop, a delightful, 7.0% alcohol by volume (ABV) American IPA with just a hint of apricot. Also out this month, Festina Peche, a Berliner Weisse-style beer, a tart session sour brewed with peaches.

If it's herbs and spice you're seeking, a few options exist. Saison du BUFF, a collaboration with Stone Brewing and Victory Brewing, is "a 6.8 percent alcohol by volume (ABV) Saison brewed with parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme." Also available, Seaquench Ale, a Kolsch, Gose and Berlinerweiss combo beer brewed with lime peel, black limes and sea salt!

The Beer Judge Certification Program (BJCP) has separate categories for 'Fruit Beer' and 'Spice/Herb/Vegetable Beer' but with both, the key is that the "The fruit should compliment the original style and not overwhelm it." I couldn't agree more. Enjoy the brews ... Cheers.

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Everyone Needs A Little Sufferin'

SUFFERIN' MOSES SOOTHES THE SOUL WITH BLUESY ROCK N' ROLL

Local band Sufferin' Moses is bringing the blues to Folly Beach with their soulful sound and gritty riffs. Influenced by classic blues artists like Freddy King, Albert King, and B.B. King (no relation), buckle your seatbelt for some southern rock, country, blues and motown music before checking out this troupe.

Frontman Zach Quillen first began performing in front of live audiences at the early age of 12. He is grateful for the solid music program at his school while growing up in Dover, Ohio. Only a short trip from The Rock n' Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, Dover honored these rock roots with a jazz band, concert choir, and marching band. Quillen began playing college bars in the area at 19. While attending Ohio University, Quillen majored in Choral Music Education with a minor in Piano. Following graduation, Quillen continued his studies at OU on music theory, when he met Brad Huffman.

"I identified with the blues," Quillen said, "and Brad agreed." The two musicians, whom had both experienced the loss of their fathers, collaborated in the spirit of musical healing. The duo played at the bars Red Brick, 19 South and The Pub in the college town of Athens, Ohio. They held the honor of being the only band ever hired to play at The Pub, but found that the local music scene was not as welcoming of the blues as they wished. In 2015, Sufferin' Moses traveled to the Semifinals for the International Blues Challenge held in Memphis, Tennessee.

"Getting mad at the blues is like getting mad at Advil, or doctors... it's about healing," Quillen stated. In search of a blues loving music scene, the band set a course to Charleston, South Carolina in 2008. Once in Charleston, the duo collaborated with Ohio native Sean Harshaw on drums to form the current three

piece arrangement of Sufferin' Moses.

"Instead of playing what the audience wanted to hear, we wanted to make our sound good enough to make people interested in our music," Quillen explained. Growing up, Quillen listened to oldies and wanted to recreate that sound. "It was like a self-soothing thing for me as a kid," Quillen disclosed. "We've tried to be real honest with ourselves musically, we just want to write music that is genuine," Quillen said. Quillen has recently been experimenting with the sounds of slide guitar and has played bass, trombone and the steel drums in the past. "Now I'm livin' on blues power," he stated. This power has propelled him around the Charleston area, with gigs at bars and restaurants throughout the city.

By choosing venues with business models, as underground as their sound, Sufferin Moses has found a friendly following here in the Lowcountry. The trio will play Surf Bar on Saturday, June 10. In the past, they have performed on Folly, at Chico Feo, St. James Gate, Loggerheads Beach Grill and Drop-In Deli. Sufferin' Moses frequently plays at The Tattooed Moose on John's Island and downtown at The Tattooed Moose and Smoke BBQ on King Street at their other location in Mount Pleasant. You can find them rocking local breweries such as Revelry and Low Tide.

"As a group, we have taken further strides in the past 2 years than over the 10 year span we have been playing together," Quillen revealed. When Quillen is not busy writing song material for the band, he enjoys teaching music theory via guitar or piano. As ZZ Top's Billy Gibbons said, "The blues is a mighty long road. Or it could be a river, one that twists and turns and flows into a sea of limitless musical potential." Join the musical journey of Sufferin' Moses Saturday, June 10 at Surf Bar on Folly Beach!



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
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Beach Movie Night is Back

TIDES PRESENTS 14 FAMILY-FRIENDLY FLICKS FOR 2017 BEACH MOVIE SERIES

Every year Tides Folly Beach offers one of the best family-friendly events on Folly Beach with its Beach Movie Series, held every Wednesday between the end of May until the end of August.

The event is free and open to the public, which are invited to bring beach chairs, blankets, popcorn, and non-alcoholic beverages to the beach in front of the hotel. Tides endures the expense of the equipment, the rights to play the movie, as well as a committed team to set up and break down each movie night. But these events are not about making money, explains Matthew Zengerle, general manager of Tides Folly Beach.

"We certainly do not make any revenue off it. In our eyes, it is a great way for us to give back to the community of Folly Beach," says Zengerle. "Folly is so special to us that we want to provide a unique and unforgettable experience to both Folly's visitors and residents."

According to Zengerle, to secure rights to the films they show Tides works with a few cinematic companies. "It is not very hard to secure the rights, just have to make sure the scheduling works out for both the company, and our schedule during the summer," he says.

In choosing movies, Zengerle says they



go off both prior success, and also new movies. "Typically I wait to make the movie schedule until the Oscars, as I typically pick a few that have been either nominated or have won for the previous year," he says. "We also look at the school schedule for families with children and try to put as many family movies as we can in that period."

Movies such as Frozen, and Finding Nemo or Dory always have a great draw, says Zengerle. "We close every season with a

feature of Jaws, because, how cool is that to watch on the beach," he says.

All Zengerle asks is that movie goers make sure they pick up after themselves after enjoying the movie. "We firmly believe that if you were able to bring it out to the beach, you are able to take it off the beach," he says. 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

DISCOVERING THE 55TH, 30 YEARS LATER



FOLLY FLASHBACK

In June 1987, relic hunters Robert Bohrn and Eric Croen uncovered the find of a lifetime. Following the tracks of a bulldozer clearing the way for houses on present day West Indian Avenue, their metal detectors alerted them to the presence of something below, in an area that they had searched before without success. What they encountered were the graves of 19 soldiers of the 55th Massachusetts regiment.

Although early reports cited 14 bodies, later analysis revealed the bones of 19 individuals at the site. Arriving on Folly soon after the 54th Massachusetts regiment that stormed Fort Wagner, the 55th remained on Folly long thereafter, clearing jungle, building fortifications and hauling supplies. The only two fully intact skeletons were found in six-sided coffins, built from sawmills on Folly Island. (Courtesy of Robert Bohrn.)



BS: It would be of all of Roger's three children, my son, and all the grandkids together, down at the lighthouse.




FC: What is one thing your neighbors would be surprised to learn about you?

From The Mountains To The Sea

EVERY GRAIN OF SAND HAS A STORY TO TELL



SALT MARSH DIARIES

The early morning sun angled across a wide low-tide beach. Symmetrical wave-derived ripples cast striped shadows across the sand. Five brown pelicans surfed the wave troughs, practically skimming the water's surface. A pod of bottlenose dolphin fished just beyond the break. As I strode along the hard-packed sand, I considered its provenance.

Our sands originate from the Appalachian Mountains. Billion-year old igneous boulders become cobbles. Cobbles become pebbles. Pebbles become sand, silt, and clay along the rock-tumbling journey from mountains to sea. Only the mountain's most durable minerals, such as quartz and feldspar, survive the long, arduous journey to form a beach along the shoreline.

I collect sand as a hobby. Travelers bring me sand from all corners of the world. Sand tells the story of the region. Constituents of the sand give hints about both its source and present place of residence. I've got black magnetite sand from Guam, granitic sand from Easter Island, and carbonate sand from the Florida Keys and Bahamas. Folly visitors from Ohio recently sent me black volcanic sand from Iceland.

A couple of years ago, I took a family trip to northern California. I collected sand from Mavericks at Half Moon Bay, then from beaches north, all the way up to Willow Creek near the Oregon border. I noticed that samples south of the San Andreas Fault consisted of



tan-gray colored sand, while gray-black sands dominated beaches north of the fault. Simply explained, several million years ago, granite-rich Rhode Island-size blocks from the Sierra Nevada Mountains broke loose, then slid northwestward along the San Andreas Fault's southern margin. Today, they sit, eroding, along the Pacific Ocean near Half Moon Bay. Erosive ocean forces turn this granite into the tan-gray quartz sand found at Mavericks. The dark sands along the coast north of the fault come from an entirely different source, namely active volcanoes, such as Mount Lassen and Mount Shasta.

During our trip, we slept outside a few nights. Then I learned that mountain lions inhabit

the area. That final night under the stars, all I could think about was mountain lions. Nervous bird chirps and dog barks stirred images of mountain lions crouching in the dark beyond the parked car. June Fishing Report

It's a fantastic time to be fishing here in Charleston! The usual suspects, redfish and trout, are now complimented by a host of seasonal species including spanish mackerel, ladyfish, and sharks. Combined with warmer temperatures, the fishing conditions are now excellent.

Redfish have been making quick work of any well placed bait. Make sure to carry your cast net and try catching some menhaden or finger mullet. We've been having the most success around rock walls, docks, and other structures while fishing live bait on a carolina rig. Make sure to use a weight heavy enough to hold the bait stationary, otherwise your rig will slide along the bottom until it snags.

As for trout, not much new here. Popping corks remain the way to go. Surprisingly, mud minnows have been outperforming live shrimp under corks. Usually, it is the other way around. If little fish keep picking at your live shrimp, switch over to a D.O.A. 3" artificial shrimp. Their Glow/Gold Rush Belly color has been quite productive.

Anglers focused on flounder have been reporting good numbers being caught. Work finger mullet along the bottom around structures. Move the bait slowly along and when you think you have a bite wait a few seconds before setting the hook. We've been picking up quite a few flounder with mud minnows under a popping cork as well.

My favorite summer time fish is the ladyfish. With the warmer weather, ladyfish will flood our waters. These exciting fish will smack bait under a popping cork and make your drag zing. Their acrobatic jumps and hard runs make these fish so entertaining. You'll find them in some of the same spots that you find trout.
