



Celebrate Dolphin Week

LOWCOUNTRY MARINE MAMMAL NETWORK IS ASKING FOR YOUR HELP IN COUNTING AND PROTECTING OUR LOCAL DOLPHIN

While Discovery Channel has practically made a national holiday out of Shark Week, local non-profit the Lowcountry Marine Mammal Network (LMMN) is hosting Dolphin Week April 22-26. It will include fun and educational activities raising awareness about local dolphins. Events will range from beach yoga on Folly to kayaking on Shem Creek. On Saturday, April 27, there will be a Dolphin Count, which is a one-day event where LMMN encourages the public to help count dolphins across the Lowcountry.

"It's an opportunity for all dolphin lovers, young and old, to be a citizen scientist and help us collect data otherwise impossible to collect," says Laura Rust, Executive Director of LMMN. "By having the community all count at the same time, we can capture a snapshot of the population, while also recording number of calves during the spring calving season and looking for behavioral hotspots."

Participants can count from one of 10 designated stations or anywhere by downloading the Dolphin Count app on to your smartphone. All counting must be done from land during the specified times.

According to Rust, Folly Beach is a very important area for LMMN's work for several reasons. First, most dolphins spend a majority of their time in a specific river and there's a high number of dolphins that call the Folly River home. There is also a high number of people that spend time on the river in some type of watercraft.

"Because of this, the dolphins encounter hundreds of people daily. Without the community's help in following the recommended viewing guidelines, the dolphins face constant harassment," says Rust, adding that disturbances to dolphins can increase stress, which can cause illness, reproductive failure, and death. Dolphins are actually federally protected, which means it's illegal to touch, swim with, feed, or harass them. LMMN strives to make the community aware of that to reduce human interactions.



"We want the community to view marine mammals responsibly for the protection of this population," says Rust.

The other component unique to Folly, according to Rust, is that dolphins strand feed around Folly Beach. Strand feeding is when they push fish ashore to feed. It's a unique feeding behavior documented in only a few places around the world, with Charleston being one of them.

"While strand feeding is amazing to see in person, this is a significant food source for some animals. Disturbing feeding dolphins causes them to abort their feeding and look for other feeding sources causing them to spend extra time and calories looking for food," explains Rust. "Disturbing this behavior is not only stressful, it's considered harassment and illegal." She recommended not approaching feeding dolphins, viewing from at least 15 yards back, keeping movement and noise to a minimum and keeping dogs back. Dolphins are more likely to continue feeding if they don't feel threatened by you. Yes, they can see you. And no dolphins do not like selfies, she adds.

"It's important for locals and tourists to realize viewing wild dolphins is a privilege

and not a media opportunity. We encourage locals to help us spread the word on the ground and be vocal to visitors that might not know the rules," says Rust. "Be respectful of the dolphin's personal space and view responsibly. Without everyone's help, we run the risk of losing these animals that rely on a safe, clean, and quiet environment to live."

LMMN also partners with the South Carolina Marine Mammal Stranding Network in the response of sick, injured, entangled, and dead marine mammals across the state. "We respond to every animal reported to collect valuable information critical to understanding the health of the population and help with management of the population," says Rust. "It's important residents and tourists know how to respond to a distressed animal."

According to Rust, never touch or push a stranded animal back into the water. And if a live animal is found, keep people and dogs away, keep the animal shaded and wet (no water in the blowhole), and call the SCDNR hotline (877-942-5343) about any animal, dead or alive) so they can respond and take appropriate action.

Dead Boat Round-Up

LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL AGENCIES WORKING TOGETHER TO REMOVE ABANDONED BOATS FROM WATERWAYS

We see them out there in the water, lurking and moored. Deadbeat boats whose owners have abandoned them to the winds and the tides.

Most of the time they just sit there, causing little harm other than being just damn ugly. Sometimes, though, the submerged hulks scrape the bottom of a boat or nick a tiller or a prop.

Even worse, sometimes during storms when wind and the water is up, they let go of their moorings and drift, smashing into innocent docks and other boats, causing costly damage.

Well, Police Chief Andrew Gilreath and everyone down at City Hall are doing something about it. The last time the city marshalled a dead-boat round-up was 11 years ago in 2008.


The city had reached out to federal and state agencies for money to help remove the dead boats littering our waterways and marshes.

And recently, the federal National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has sent along close to \$65,000 in grant money through the state's Ocean and Coastal Management agency to get rid of the eyesores.

The city will likely have to match the grant, as more abandoned vessels are identified.

City Administrator Spencer Wetmore says the city is "hoping to work with state Department of Natural Resources, the U.S. Coast Guard, and OCRM to put new regulations into place to prevent further problematic mooring, particularly near the boat landing."

State Rep. Peter McCoy (R-Charleston), has some good news on that front: "We have also been able to secure money in the [state] budget to match the federal funds to help with this issue. The budget has now moved to the Senate. I have also filed a bill to help with this issue. It is moving in the house. This is an absolute priority."

Chief Gilreath says many of the boats also pose an environmental threat.

"The boats will have gas in their tanks; additionally, the fiberglass, oil and batteries over time present a concern when it comes to them leaking, especially when the vessel is underwater," he says.

Gilreath and his officers, who already have access to the waterways via boat, have already begun the process of designating which boats that meet criteria for removal. They have been mapping their locations over the past few years to see how storms affect their location.

Gilreath says there is a concentration of discarded sailboats near the bridge, but not on the other side as they couldn't have passed under it. He also says that many of the boats are squirreled away in creeks and rivers, and though maybe not as visible, easily as loathsome.

Apparently, vessels "anchored" by a five-pound bucket of concrete become a full-size sail when storm winds hit them and drive them into troubled waters

The city will soon begin taking bids from marine removal companies to come in and

remove the dead boats. Those that have sunk to the bottom may be strapped and pulled up via wenchers or with the aid of airbags, according to the police chief.

Once accessible, the boats will be picked over for mitigation of gas, batteries, and the like before being crane-lifted onto a barge, and then eventually crushed and stored at the county landfill, he says.

There are no plans to use any of the boat carcasses as "artificial reefs," as the vessels pose too much of an environmental threat.

Gilreath warns that while it is completely legal to take or scavenge dead boats, there are serious safety concerns in boarding the things, and that whatever valuables may have already been taken.





SATURDAY, MARCH 9 CRAY CRAY GOES TO THE BEACH

The Responding Officer (R/O) had pulled over a vehicle on a traffic stop around 11:30 p.m. near 1 Center Street. The Deputy Chief had backed him up. As the officer was chatting with the driver he heard a commotion behind him, and turned to see the Deputy Chief verbally engaged with a man who was screaming and being aggressive. He dismissed the driver and moved to assist the Deputy Chief. When the officer approached the 26-year-old male subject, the subject began asking a series of nonsensical questions and making nonsensical statements. He asked the officer why the officer was running away from him and said he was yelling because he thought the officer needed help and was running away. The man was handcuffed for safety. A witness was interviewed. The witness, an 18-year-old male, said he and some friends were at the beach after prom, and that when they were leaving, the subject had attempted to get into

the car with them. When the witness told him to go away, the subject said "don't be a hero," and started chasing the witness around the car. Due to his erratic behavior, the subject was placed under arrest. After they got him into the patrol car, the subject began kicking the windows and spitting. Another charge of Resisting Arrest was added, and the subject was taken to jail.

SUNDAY, MARCH 10 CONJURING UP SOME CRIMES

The R/O was dispatched to a local café around 7:15 a.m. in reference to suspicious activity. Upon arrival, he met with a man who said he worked there and was about to open the back door when he heard and saw someone on the porch near the door. The man said he was startled because no one was supposed to be there at that time. The officer approached and opened the back door and saw a man walking towards him. He detained the man and brought him out to the porch for interview. The apparently drunk subject, who was identified by his S.C. Driver's License as a 41-year-old Tradd Street resident, said he was just there, "hanging out." Asked if he knew anyone who worked there, the subject repeated, "hanging out." Further investigation found nothing missing or damaged inside the restaurant. The subject was arrested for Trespassing and Public Intoxication and taken to jail.

SUNDAY, MARCH 10 THIS AIN'T DAYTONA

The R/O was dispatched to the 1400 block of East Ashley Avenue around 8 p.m. in reference to a vehicle mishap. Upon arrival, the officer found a Toyota SUV parked on the beach about 10 feet from

the roadway. The evidence showed the vehicle had collided with a wooden fence and proceeded onto the beach. There was damage to the right front fender and wheel area. The driver, a 30-year-old male, said he was not injured. But the officer did believe the man was intoxicated. After failing the field sobriety test, the subject was taken to the station, and blew a .29 on the Breathalyzer (.08 is considered legally drunk). The driver was charged with Driving Under the Influence with a blood alcohol level greater than .16.

FRIDAY, MARCH 15 NIGHT GOES FROM BAD TO WORSE

The R/O was dispatched to the Circle K around 9:15 p.m. in reference to a disturbance. Upon arrival, he met with the clerk and a 39-year-old male who was claiming he had been shortchanged. The subject was mostly calm, but at times got boisterous about race and respect. After some investigating, it was found the man had not been shortchanged. He was allowed to apologize and leave.

However, two hours later, the same officer was on routine patrol when he spotted the subject talking to another man in the middle of Center Street. The officer directed the men to move to the sidewalk, but they declined. They were ordered several more times before the other man complied. Instead of moving to the sidewalk from the middle of the road, the subject became combative towards the officer and then stripped down to his underwear while screaming, "you all go ahead and lock me up." In an effort to satisfy the request, the R/O took hold of the subject in an attempt to cuff him, but the subject pulled away. The officer and subject scuffled and struggled, but eventually, with the help of several more

police officers, the subject was cuffed and stuffed (he fought it) into the back of the patrol car. He was taken to jail and charged with Disorderly Conduct and Resisting Arrest.

SATURDAY, MARCH 16 NAUGHTY LEPRECHAUN

The R/O was dispatched to The Tides hotel bar around 8 p.m. in reference to a problematic customer. Staff said the man was causing problems and refusing to leave. Upon arrival, the officer found the man, dressed all in green, sitting at the bar. The officer observed the man was highly intoxicated. He was slurring his words, swaying back and forth, and "had no motor fundamentals." Asked for his ID, the subject was unable to find it. The officer asked the bartender if they could charge his tab to the room, and the bartender did so. The R/O then escorted the 51-year-old subject to his room. There they found his ID. The subject was told to stay in the room for the night and not leave. The officer then went back to the parking lot. There he observed the subject leave his room, get on the elevator, and appear in the parking lot. The subject was immediately arrested for Disorderly Conduct and taken to jail.

SATURDAY, MARCH 16 CRIMES HIGH AND LOW

The R/O was dispatched to the east end of Folly towards the lighthouse and old Coast Guard station around 10:15 p.m. in reference to a case of possibly underage drinking. Upon arrival, he unlocked the combination lock on the gate and entered the pathway, although the officer re-closed the gate, he left the lock next to the gate. When he returned about two hours later, the lock was gone.

The suspect(s) was unsuccessful in breaking into the car.

A LONGTIME FOLLY LOCAL SAYS GOOD-BYE




Dear Editor,

After some difficulty finding a place to apply my living stipend I was approached by a coworker who inquired if I had secured living quarters. "Not yet" said I. "Well, Jim, we've been talking and we think you should go to Folly Beach." I guess they sized me up pretty well and that's where it all started. In those days Folly Beach was what fond memories recall it to be. I found affordable accommodations in a front beach apartment with no phone or TV just the joy of living on the "Edge". Five years later I returned as a permanent resident and property owner. It seemed like destiny. Alas, now after nearly 30 years in residence I'm leaving.

Sadly, it's not the same place where I thought

traps. I won't miss the Myrtle Beach style t-shirt shops with no local connection where I never shopped anyway (Mr. John's rules!). It's been lovely but a fond farewell to what used to be is all I can muster.

MUSICIAN LANCE STARR'S LONG-LOST GUITAR FINDS IT'S WAY
HOME WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM CITY HALL

More than a decade after his one-of-a-kind guitar went missing from the room above what's now St. James Gate, musician Lance Starr has been reunited with his long-lost instrument. The electric guitar was found in 2008 and placed in the lost and found at Folly Beach City Hall. Starr, who's been playing music for more than 30 years, first moved to Charleston from his hometown of Cleveland, Ohio in 1996 to play reggae music. He explained that the Jamaicans he knew in Cleveland claimed that he was faking being American and believed that he was really a Jamaican, so they called him 'Starr' and the name stuck.

Starr's first band, Reggae Nation, toured along the East Coast from Boston to Key West, until he found himself in Pensacola, Florida where he started his next band Satta. And then Starr pursued a solo career when he moved to the Lowcountry in 1996, playing gigs all over Charleston, from downtown at The Music Farm to James Island and Folly Beach.

On Folly, Starr enjoyed jamming at Tides (then The Holiday Inn), Rita's, and Surf Bar. In the past Starr has also performed at Piccolo Spoleto Festival and MOJA Arts Festival. Last year, he headlined Jerk Fest at Magnolia Plantation, singing to 2,000 festival-goers. "Feels better to play for 1,000 people for free than being paid to play for 100," he says.

Currently, Lance Starr plays guitar Sundays at Ebenezer AME Church downtown and Mount Zion AME Church. About 15 years ago, Lance opened up for Ziggy Marley at The Plex in Charleston. Mr. Starr has shared the stage with artists such as Gerald Levert, Third World, and Yellow Man.

Starr first picked up a guitar at the early age of 8. When he was 15, a schoolmate named Kevin gave him a kickstart by teaching him to play. Starr first studied dancehall reggae but now his sound has evolved to a more bluesy-jazz style. He says his guitar playing has



been influenced by famed guitarists such as B.B. King, Bob Marley, George Benson, Jimi Hendrix, Santana, Gary Clark Jr., and Wes Montgomery.

Starr's lost guitar was custom made by a guitar company in Seattle, that operates under the name Boogie Bodies. The luthier (someone who makes stringed instruments), Lynn Ellsworth, has made guitars for guitar legend Eddie Van Halen. Eric Clapton liked the bodies of Boogie Bodies guitars so much that he would screw Fender necks on their guitar bodies.

Since the guitar was custom-made for Starr, there was no serial number visible on the outside so when it ended up in City Hall's Lost & Found back in 2008, there

was no way to identify it. Recently Public Safety was cleaning out some Lost & Found items to put on an auction site and the guitar garnered a lot of attention. After nearly 12 years, Public Safety employees unscrewed the neck of the guitar from the body and noticed the name Boogie Bodies was stamped inside next to Lance Starr's handwritten name.

The one-piece body of the guitar is made from Alder wood with a Sunburst lacquer finish, all gold hardware and the old bridge style seen in guitars from the '50s. "The guitar has a vintage tone like one of Buddy Holly's," says Starr. He estimates the guitar to be worth anywhere from \$2,500 to \$4,000 now.



Drop In Hangs 10

THE DROP IN BAR & DELI CELEBRATES A DECADE IN BUSINESS ON FOLLY BEACH

A 10-year high school reunion can be amusing and usually pretty entertaining. A 10-year marriage anniversary is considered an encouraging milestone in a couple's love story. But a restaurant/bar celebrating 10 years in today's ever-changing trendy food and beverage world? It's almost unheard of, but that's an honor that the Drop In Bar & Deli can now boast as of this month when they officially celebrate a decade in business.

It starts with a consistently fresh and delicious deli menu that you can have delivered to you anywhere on the island. Add in the tasty and diverse Sushi by Lisa bar that runs Tuesday-Friday, along with the rotating local and craft beer taps and you have yourself a recipe for success. There's also live music with great local musicians, a trivia night, Honky Tonk Tuesday, and loads of other fun promotions. Basically, walk in on any given day or night and you'll find a good time. "Folly Beach has changed a lot over the years since we started, but we always try to do something fun for the locals," says co-owner Lewis Dodson, who also is part owner in Cannon Distillery, which is proudly served at the Drop In.

Dodson started the Drop In along with his friends and partners Gavin Lyons, Matt Loda, and Thomas Byers back in 2009. "We had all been working together at Woody's for years so we already knew each other really well when the lease came up for the old Dolphin Deli," says Lyons. "Loda had the idea we continue on in the space making sandwiches as well. It was done on a total shoestring budget but we worked around the clock and got the place opened in about a month, just in time for the Sea and Sand Festival."

Dodson says they were all regular customers of the Dolphin Deli and when it closed their was a void, not only in the local dining scene, but in his belly. "I thought, who's going deliver my sandwiches on a Saturday when the Dolphin Deli isn't here? So we saw an opportunity and we said 'let's do it.'"

Things were not always smooth, recalls Dodson, who remembers opening amidst a recession the same year five other restaurants on Folly Beach opened. "The economy was tanking. Folly Beach was so dead that

summer. And it took us a while to get our beer and wine and liquor license. For the first summer we didn't even have liquor." But Drop In weathered the storm while the other five restaurants are either under new ownership or have since shuttered their doors.

According to the Lyons, he thinks a big reason they have lasted while others have not is that it's always been locally owned and operated. "It was started by guys who had been working and living on Folly for years and that still rings true today. Plus our staff has been great over the years. We've been lucky enough to hire some great people, which in

turn also brings in great people," he says.

A year or so into the venture Dodson, Lyons, and Loda bought out Byers and the three partners have kept the funky deli and dive bar going, each adding their own little touch.

Lyons takes credit for creating The Drop In's most famous sandwich, The Redneck. A chicken Philly "with Whiz," add bacon, caramelized onions, jalepeños, and ranch dressing is quite possiblet the perfect sandwich.

"It was kind of a novelty at first and not on the menu but regulars would come in and order it. It gained a little more popularity and

then the *Charleston City Paper* did a small blurb about it being one of the best hangover meals in the city," says Lyons. "A little while after that we heard (celebrity chef) Sean Brock was at an event in town making the exact same sandwich with the exact same name. We don't know for sure if he actually got the idea from us ... but we like to think so."

Loda can still be seen weekly hosting the island's longest-running trivia game every Wednesday night. While Dodson doesn't usually man the bar for Honky Tonk Tuesdays anymore, he recalls when he came up with the idea nearly a decade ago. "So that first year was crazy. I was working like 16 or 18-hour days. During those times, I needed some kind of relief. So I started playing country music just to get back at some of the hippies a little bit and maybe catch a breather," he says laughing. "As it turned out people loved it and it became popular."

Of all the ups and downs and crazy memories over the last decade, Dodson says that meeting his wife-to-be at the Drop In stands out as the most memorable. "We hired her just before we opened and six months later we started dating," recalls Dodson. "Last week we celebrated one-year wedding anniversary."

Speaking of anniversaries, traditionally a 10-year anniversary calls for a gift of aluminum or tin ... we're thinking go with an aluminum can of your favorite beer or raise a tin cup of something to toast to these guys at their 10 Year Anniversary Jubilee on Saturday, April 14, from 12-7 p.m., with live music from Red Cedar Review (1-3 p.m.) and Royal Tinfoil (4-7 p.m.) There will also be food and drink specials all day long.

Cheers to the Drop In for 10 fantastic years, and here's to the next 10!



A Truly American Wheat

concern. The traditional offerings did not travel well, and the local attempts had little to offer. While I now love most wheat beers, it was not the typical hefe that won me over, it was a truly American move that sold me on wheat beers, and that was hops!

The beer that changed my view was Oberon Ale. Brewed by Bell's Brewery out of Kalamazoo, Michigan, Oberon is spectacular, and such a great leap above other wheat beers that I can't believe more breweries don't follow suit. And, while there are other related beers from a few different microbreweries, it's Oberon that for me is the real winner.

The key to Oberon's awesomeness is, of course something that American brewers love, hops. Oberon is basically a hoppy wheat beer. Such a small shift is not a huge leap of thinking and I cannot believe every brewery does not make a similar style. Oberon is an American breed of wheat beer, very distinct from the yeasty, clove and banana, orange and coriander ales of Germany and Belgium.

Oberon is classified as an American pale wheat ale, which is basically our 'easier-

going' version of a German hefeweizen. Given our craft beer beginnings likely followed with the success of APA (American Pale Ale), I've always felt that this style of beer should have been given the title WPA (wheat pale ale). But, maybe a new category should be made for this and a small collection of similar beers. Hop-wheat ale?

The title pale wheat ale, nearly all wheat beers being of the ale family, gives the notion of a thin, watery, weak wheat beer, of which Oberon is certainly not. Nor is this Bell's Brewery beauty one of the new trend of wheat IPA beers such as Boulevard Brewing's Reboot White IPA or Deschutes Chainbreaker White IPA; first and foremost IPA's, with a gentle hint of wheat added to the malt bill to smooth out the beer.

No, Oberon Ale, and similar beers such as Lagunitas A Little Sumpin' Sumpin', and even Sam Adams Summer Ale are wheat beers by nature, with hops playing a supporting role.

Oberon and its brethren are first cousins of standard wheat beer, so you should expect some level of yeast and smoothness

of mouthfeel from them. Golden colors to not quite orange are expected as well. However, the next closest relative is American pale ale, so a balance of malt and hops will also exist, much like you find in the better examples of our delicious APAs.

Oberon pours up a severely hazy shade of grapefruit skin with a huge head of stark white foam. Lace covers the sides of the glass, and a nice layer of foam remains as the beer drains. Citrus and spice scents emanate from the glass. Summer malts and toasted notes blend with pear and citrus flavors, all the while a spicy bitter note runs just underneath.

Bell's uses Saaz hops, which give a spicy bitterness to this wheat and fruity ale. Certainly more savory and tasty than any wheat beer I've ever had. The mouthfeel is wonderful, and even with this much flavor, it's an easy drinker and extremely refreshing.

If you're not quite ready for the summer wheat invasion, but need a little zing to your spring, give American pale wheat ales a try. Enjoy the brews ... Cheers.



Family has Texas-Sized Fun on Folly



SALT MARSH DIARIES

An extended family from Texas met me at the dock. Mom, Dad, and the four grandkids had driven to Folly from Houston for spring break. Grandma and Grandpa flew in from West Texas to join them. They came from the oil fields of Midland, a Permian Basin town just east of New Mexico. We got settled aboard the boat. Dad asked what class of boat

we were in. Not sure how to answer, I told him we were in a Carolina Skiff made in Georgia equipped to legally carry up to 12 passengers. He seemed satisfied. I appreciated his curiosity. The four kids ranged from a sulking 7th grader to a manically-happy 4-year-old.

Southwest Texas, where the Grams lived, is oil country. Here the Permian Basin contains the richest known oil play in North America. Just recently in the Delaware Basin (part of the Permian basin) huge (HUGE!!!) newly discovered oil reserves have been documented.

For hundreds of millions of years, what became Southwest Texas existed as a shallow tropical sea. A vast, highly productive reef of coral, sponges,

brachiopods, and other organisms thrived here, creating kilometers thick carbonate sedimentary layers destined to lithify into oil rich source rock.

About 320 million years ago all the earth's continents began huddling together into one landmass known as Pangaea. Great tectonic forces associated with Pangaea's formation split the Permian basin into the Delaware basin and the Midland Basin. The associated tectonic mountain-building began filling the basins with sediments, smothering the reefs.

Eventually, climatic shifts dried up the inland sea to form thick layers of anhydrite and salt, known as evaporites. The trapped organics beneath these

evaporite layers cooked into a nice pot of oil-producing gumbo.

This basin has steadily produced oil since the end of World War I. Because of technology, such as directional drilling and hydraulic fracturing, high-volume oil production continues today.

Before the family climbed back onto the boat from Morris Island's beach, I took their photo. "How big is Texas?" I yelled. All arms swung wide for the shot.



FOLLY FISHING REPORT

Wonderful sunny weather has continued day after day making for awesome fishing conditions. With all this warm weather, it's no surprise that our fishery is 4-6 weeks ahead of schedule. The water is teeming with bait and anglers can expect April to be a fantastic month of fishing.

The large schools of redfish found throughout the winter are breaking up as these fish become more active. Anglers should think about using artificial plastic lures that mimic baitfish. One good choice would be "jerk shad" lures that have become very popular and come in a variety of colors. I've been finding that hues of silver and blue have been working best and produce even when water clarity is poor. These lures work best rigged on a size 3/0 flutter hook.

The trout bite should really begin in earnest this April. With water temperatures so warm, it's hard to believe they won't become aggressive feeders before too long. The preferred

rig of live bait under a popping cork is hard to beat. Live shrimp is now available and will give you another option than mud minnows. It's a good idea to start carrying your cast net and see if you can find some finger mullet. Finger mullet under a cork is just deadly.

Flounder, perhaps our tastiest fish, are now present and eating. We've been catching them mostly when fishing with mud minnows on the bottom or mud minnows under popping corks. You'll need to focus on structure when targeting flounder. Docks and pilings are good places to prospect. Flounder will hug the bottom in hopes of ambushing their prey, so you'll need to keep that bait down and in their strike zone. See you on the water!


