

# Folly Gets Washed Out

Record high tide and storm surge from Nor'easter batters Folly Beach

olly Beach had a near-record 9.86 tide on Sunday, Dec. 17 due to a Nor'Easter storm that battered the East Coast, causing widespread damaging flooding to the Charleston area.

It was the fourth highest tide on record in Charleston, according to the National Weather Service. It was the highest nontropical high tide recorded.

Despite being updated on the latest weather alerts and knowing that the storm would hit at the unfortunate same time as high tide, "I don't think any of us expected that big a storm surge," said Eric Lutz, public works director for the City of Folly Beach. "We don't get Nor'Easters often. We just had two or three officers on duty in public safety and the normal three-person fire crew."

Lutz said he spoke with Folly Beach Public Safety Chief Andrew Gilreath Sunday morning about whether or not to bring in more public safety officers, but ultimately decided that it wasn't safe for officers who live off-island to navigate roads and bridges leading on to Folly Beach that were becoming more flooded by the minute.

"We had high winds and safety messages about how downtown Charleston was flooded out and navigation all over town was rough. At that point (I said), 'We're just going to have to ride it out. We just decided to hunker down and begin dealing with it the next day," Lutz said.

As water spilled over Folly Road between Bowen's Island and Crosby's Seafood, leaving seagrass and other debris on the road, the city coordinated with the South Carolina Department of Transportation to close travel lanes to and from Folly Beach for about an hour.

"It was so deep, you couldn't know if a car was going to make it all the way across," Lutz said. "Water was rushing across the road



and it was bringing up the marsh grasses and everything. It came on so quickly, we couldn't deploy barricades or anything."

Thankfully, as the tide went out hours later, the majority of the water went with it. Lutz said there were no distress calls or reports of any power outages.

As the tide went out, the Department of Transportation cleared the stretch of roadway using backhoes and dump trucks to push the debris off to the shoulders to make the travel lanes safe. By 3 p.m., the road to and from Folly was open to traffic again.

Lutz said that only Tabby Drive on the east side of the island remained flooded and closed off to traffic by Monday morning. The public works department had to pump out the water on Tabby Drive over a berm and into the nearby marsh to clear it. Tabby Drive was passable by Monday afternoon, Lutz said.

The public works crew cleaned up debris on the island for the next several days, picking up furniture and carpets that were brought by residents to the side of the road and hiring an electrician to reconnect the Christmas lights at Folly River Park that shorted out due to the flooding.

While there isn't yet a dollar amount on how much the city spent on extra manpower and equipment on the storm's cleanup, Lutz said it will come from department contingency funds.

### Ramping up for Beach Renourishment

Folly Beach is set to receive another significant beach renourishment in the spring, and this storm showed the importance of rebuilding the beach more than ever. Lutz said if the spring renourishment had not already been scheduled, the city would likely have

had to discuss interim emergency measures to build back the sand loss, which tore down sand fencing in some areas near the Washout. Lutz said coastal experts were surveying the beach after the storm, calculating the amount of sand loss.

"We lost probably about an average of about 20 feet of dunes," Lutz said. "(Experts) have assured me that (the renourishment project) can account for the extra sand loss because of the storm."

Lutz said that as sea levels rise, residents should prepare for more frequent flooding and help build living shorelines and other measures to help protect their property.

"Things are happening faster and more frequently than they used to," Lutz said. "Thankfully, most people on the island are resilient. I'd be worried if we got another one like that before the renourishment."

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# Councilmember Eddie Ellis Announces Resignation

Ellis has listed his home for sale, will serve on council through the end of March

n Tuesday, Jan. 2, Folly Beach City Councilman Eddie Ellis sent out a letter to Mayor Tim Goodwin and others announcing that he would be resigning his post on March 30 of this year. The announcement immediately sent a ripple throughout the island. Not even two months after a contentious election for three council seats, it looks like the voters of Folly Beach will have to go to the polls again and choose a new city council member. Ellis' seat was not up for re-election this past year, so a special election will be held in April to fill the remainder of his term, which runs through 2025.

According to Ellis, the timing of his

resignation was not a coincidence. Announcing it when he did and stepping aside on March 30 would allow the special election to piggyback on a previously scheduled election held by the Charleston County Election Commission in April.

"I feel good about leaving. The city is in good hands, I think that the mayor and council are working good together right now and staff is doing a great job," Ellis told the Folly Current, citing personal reasons for his leaving office. "I would encourage the voters to elect someone who would bring unity to the island."

While he said he planned to wait to announce his reasoning at next month's

council meeting on Feb. 13, he has recently listed his condo for sale. Ellis confirmed that he does currently hold a 72-day Short-Term Rental (STR) license on the property, where he has personally lived since 2005.

Out of concerns with having an active real estate listing during a time when council is still discussing and voting on items related to STRs, Ellis says the city has contacted the state Ethics Commission for an official opinion on whether he should recuse himself from any votes relating to STRs.

Ellis has served on council since 2004, with the exception of one term. He has owned a landscaping and painting business in the area for 28 years.





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

### FOLLY'S WONDER WOMAN

Volunteer extraordinaire Vanessa Oltmann named S.C. Dept. of Natural Resources Volunteer of the Year

ountless baby sea turtles hatched on Folly Beach have made it successfully into the Atlantic Ocean thanks to Vanessa Oltmann, a Folly Beach resident and tireless turtle team volunteer who combs the beach before the sun rises every morning during nesting season to give the turtles the best chance of survival. She was recently nominated as volunteer of the year from the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources for her work with sea turtle conservation.

Oltmann dove headfirst into sea turtle conservation and environmental advocacy when she and her husband moved to Folly Beach nine years ago. Oltmann and her husband had been visiting Folly Beach for 18 years.

"I fell in love with Folly and the festivals and the people. It was just so cool and it's where my first volunteering started," Oltmann said. "I first started working with Surfer's Healing and have been volunteering with them for probably nine years. I met somebody from the aquarium and that got me involved in litter removal."

A lover and nature and sea turtles, Oltmann is a volunteer member of the Folly Beach Turtle Team, which is 55 members strong. Her duties include inventory of turtle nests, reporting any false crawls and digging up nests by hand to inventory the number of eggs or relocate eggs if the mother laid the nest below the high tide line. She also helps with stranded turtles.

"I'm in the company of very special people because when we get up in the mornings and we hit the beach (to look for nests), it can be 100 degrees outside and we're still out there. If it rains, we're out there in the rain. The only time we're not on the beach is if it's thundering and

lightning, but I have sat in my car and waited for the storm to pass and gone back out," Oltmann said.

Oltmann had a record year in sea turtle nesting relocation. She helped discover 13 nests.

"My duty is that once the mother lays the eggs and doesn't come back to the nest, I'm to monitor the nest and I'm to watch it. It's my passion," she said. "I love it. It's one with nature and I'm able to be a part of something that's very magical."

She said discovering nests isn't as easy as following tracks due to false crawls and false nests.

"We're taught how to probe the nest—I used to be a well operator in Georgia. So I already knew how to probe for water; this time, I'm probing for eggs. The egg chamber is actually almost two feet down and I usually dig anywhere from 18 inches to 2 feet," Oltmann said. "I love sea life—I love wildlife and we've got to protect the

earth. This is all we have."

Oltmann's activism extends beyond her work on the Turtle Team; Oltmann is the mind behind the Toby the Turtle cartoon character through the Folly Association of Business (FAB). Toby recognizes local businesses who clean up litter. Oltmann had the idea to get everyone involved in the effort to clean up liter—including kids and the next generation of residents.

"I wanted a cartoon character that would actually draw kids in to want to learn about litter; he's swimming around, he wants you to take care of the water and get the litter out," said Oltmann, who often dresses in costume. "I created Toby, and I made him real. He's a superhero."

She said Toby has gained so much popularity that kids were yelling his name and waving to him at the recent Folly Beach Christmas parade. He's also a local mascot to bring awareness for the nationwide World Oceans Day.


Oltmann organizes beach sweeps that draw upwards of 100 people to help clean Folly Beach with more than 68,00 pieces of litter collected.

"I tell people what they can do to protect the turtles, like take your beach equipment off the beach because turtle babies can get stuck in them. And cover your holes. Awareness is one of the things that we can do," Oltmann said.

The volunteer of the year nomination was a recognition of the 13 nests that she helped discover and Oltmann said she teared up when she got the letter informing her of the honor.

"I love it because it makes people want to volunteer, too. There is a domino effect and people see me do it, then they want to do it too," she said. "I do it because I love it and because I have the passion. I'd go out there if I could and swim with the turtles. Who knows? Maybe I did in a previous life."


### **RECKLESS DRIVING**

Officers responded to reports of a man who was urinating in public on a Folly Beach residential street and arrested the 24-year-old for disorderly conduct. It started when a man and his wife observed the man urinating outside while holding a case of beer. Officers arrived and approached the man and smelled alcohol on his breath and noticed he had glassy eyes. He admitted to urinating in public and many people came outside of what appeared to be a party and began "hindering the investigation," according to the report. Once officers removed the offender from the party, he became argumentative, stating that officers are biased because the person who complained in the first place was an off-duty officer and his wife. The suspect's father called Folly Beach law enforcement to say that his son has low sodium levels "which causes him to urinate at anytime, anywhere." The offender said he didn't know what his father was talking about.


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# Circles in the Sand

Kurt Cohan sand creations are magnificent and temporary

f you mysteriously stumbled upon a massive sand mural on Folly Beach in 2023, Kurt Cohan was probably the culprit.

Cohan has made a spiritual practice out of creating art in the sand at low tide using a landscape rake. After viewing a creation of Cohan's, a friend of his once commented, "Dude, it looks like an alien ship landed right here." His murals have even stretched up to half the size of a football field."

"Everyone is amazed at the size and how symmetrical they are," said Cohan, who uses sticks and string as a geometric compass for his freehanded designs that feature sacred geometry like mandalas.

Cohan's first raking was several years ago on a baseball field back home in Kentucky, where he grew micro greens and vegetables to sell on his urban farm. Two years ago, he lost his mother to lung cancer, and his business closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, so he left Kentucky to

travel along the Southeastern shore. Along his journey south, Cohan stopped in Kitty Hawk, Hatteras, Morehead City, Atlantic Beach, Surf City, Carolina Beach, Myrtle Beach, Surfside Beach, and Pawleys Island. Cohan has now raked everywhere between here and the Outer Banks. On Folly Beach, Cohan has created sand art on both tips of the island. He enjoys raking at the County Park on Folly, as well as on the out by the Lighthouse Inlet Heritage Preserve. According to Cohan, his ideal spot to create murals on Folly Beach has to be the 13th block of Folly's East side.

"Art is for everybody ... It's a process of creating art for everyone to participate and enjoy," says Cohan, who has even gotten groups together to create murals on the beach.

Cohan says he draws inspiration from ancient symbols such as the Flower of Life, Tree of Life and Metatron. A recent

creation of his was a large-scale Celtic knot. Cohan says he feels a connection to nature while working outside, which he learned from his mother, who was a gardener. But he believes that he inherited his artistic skill from his father.

"Anytime you can sit in nature and create art is time spent healing," says Cohan. Part of his creative process is staying until his art is washed away by the ocean. He finds the impermanence of his art symbolic of the cycle of life.

"Deep in my heart, I just want love and peace for everybody," says Cohan, who hopes to share his magical art with many more Folly beachgoers in 2024. He uses this time spent creating to harness good energy to project into the next year.



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



he morning of New Year's Day, 1987, a wind-driven 8.81 tide sloshed waves across Arctic Avenue from numerous pocket beaches. At the washout, ocean water flowed across the road, through yards, then into the marsh on the backside

Later that morning, I walked down East Arctic from 6th block. Rubble covered the road near the pocket beach on East 5th Street. Next door, beach wrack covered the uneven concrete driveway between two yellow beach-cottages, where Bob and Carol Linville, Sally Beach, and O.D. once lived.

This extreme tide, the 2nd largest nonstorm related-tide event on record, exposed some coastal vulnerabilities, prompting passage of The South Carolina Beachfront Management Act.

Eight years prior to the 1987 New Year's Day storm, a study by coastal scientists Fitzgerald, Fico, and Hayes (1979) determined that the Charleston jetties restricted southbound coastal sand destined for Folly Island.

Since the Charleston Harbor jetties were found liable for (some of) Folly's chronic erosion problem, Folly Beach was exempt from much of The Beachfront Management Act.

As a result of this exemption, those numerous pocket beaches mentioned earlier became homesites after beach renourishments started in 1993.

On Dec. 17, 2023 another huge tide event occurred. This marks the highest non-storm related tide event to date. At 9.86 feet, this tide is also the 4th largest tide on record in Charleston, including past hurricanes and

tropical storms.

Though over a foot higher than the 1987 New Year's Day tide, much of the island was protected by a substantial dune field created by numerous aforementioned beach renourishments. After hours of pounding surf, the big tide laid waste to some of the protective dune fields.

This most recent monster tide washed through several beach walk-overs and (again) across the road at The Washout, which is Folly Beach's most vulnerable section along the island's 6-mile strand.

The aptly-named "Washout," a stretch of erosional beach from approximately East 14th block to East 16th block (plus or minus), is the location of a historical ephemeral tidal inlet between Folly Island and Little Folly Island.


The Washout is also a natural sediment bypass area that seldom accumulates enough dry sand to form protective dunes.

These two tides, occurring thirty-six years apart, may seem like freak occurrences, but this is less the case for the latter event.

In 1987, while early debates of humandriven climate change took place among academics, the general population wasn't considering such vulnerabilities. Nowadays, the effects of climate change, including a warming earth and rising sea level, are coming at us like a locomotive down a tunnel.

To examine climate-related changes occurring in the coastal environment, let's look at the data. According to the National Weather Service Coastal Flooding Database, high tide in Charleston has exceeded 7.5 feet 257 times since 1921. Of those 257 tides exceeding 7.5 feet, 171 (67%) of them have





occurred since 2010.

In addition, High tide has exceeded 8 feet 48 times since 1921. Of those 48 tides above 8 feet, 35 (73%) of them have occurred since 2010.

Since 1921, the top ten 7.5-foot and 8-foot tide exceedance years happen to be the last ten years. There's a trend here.

To put things in perspective, Charleston and Folly Beach high tides between 5.5 and 6.5 feet are considered "normal," depending on the moon phase.

One long-time local made this telling

observation: "Twice my yard has flooded from high tides in the quarter century since I've lived here. Both were this year."

The data don't lie. It's reasonable to expect tides to keep getting higher. Tolerance of increased coastal flooding may be the price of living in Paradise.

- 2. Create orderliness: Arrange items or

tools for easy access that makes the most sense.

- 3. Cleanliness: Keep the workspace clean and tidy.
- 4. Systemize practices and techniques.
- 5. Discipline: Keep the effort going, despite that hard day at the office.

Some other things that may help: Involve others but ultimately rely on yourself. Is your partner flaking out on going walking today? Go without them.

Isolating problems or weak areas. If there's a problem, find a solution. Test the solution, Are you happy with the results? If they're positive then adopt that practice. Be proactive. Let go of perfectionism and make adaptive changes. Gather information from multiple sources and people with different approaches. Use creativity and finally, never stop improving.




