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

A Clean Sweep

Toby's Earth Month island-wide spring sweep a success

More than 200 volunteers combed Folly Beach from nine different stations on Sunday, April 7, as part of Toby The Turtle's Earth Month Islandwide Spring Sweep. They collected and recorded 12,531 pieces of debris (10,433 on roadways and 2,098 on the beach). The total count included 992 cigarette butts on Center Street/ business district and 1,292 cigarette butts on the beach.

The most common debris found at Lighthouse Reserve was beer cans and glass bottles. Other banned items included retail plastic bags, Styrofoam cooler/cups, and balloons, which are a danger to wildlife and marine life.

The last seven Toby's Sweep events have welcomed 1,154 Earth Warriors collecting more than 78,814 pieces of debris.

Thea next public sweep, hosted by Toby the Turtle and the South Carolina Aquarium will be Sunday, May 19, from 4:30-5:30 p.m. Location to be announced.

Fink Wins Folly Beach Special Election

Nearly 1,000 people turned out for special election to fill vacated city council seat last month

The votes are in and new council member Skip Fink will be Folly Beach's newest council member following a special election held Tuesday, April 23 to fill the unexpired term for Eddie Ellis, who announced in January he was moving out of the state.

According to official election results, Fink received 556 votes. Jody Lynn Rogers, who also ran for the open seat, received 416 votes. There were two write-in votes. Fink will hold the seat until the council term expires in April 2026.

Fink, originally from St. Petersburg, FL, spent a 25-year career as a Marine Corps Officer and retired as a colonel. In a statement to the *The Folly Current* he stated that he was humbled by Folly residents' vote of confidence in him as an elected official.

"I am both humbled and motivated by the opportunity to serve in this important role, and pledge to represent ALL our city residents, employees, businesses, and visitors as fairly and as best I can," he wrote. "To my supporters, you made this happen, but to those who favored my opponent, I will continue to hear your concerns and will commit to bring collectively intellect, compassion and diligence to the issues we face moving forward. As a community, we may disagree on specific solutions, but let's do so agreeably as friends and neighbors with civility; that's what makes Folly both funky and functional! My first order of



business will be delving into the budget discussions for 2024-2025, which begins as soon as I take office! A special thanks to the City staff for continued diligence in our governance and preserving quality of life for all. Let's press on together!"

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
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Catching Some Fun

Folly Current reporter gets some fishing tips before annual tournament returns to Folly Pier

had never fished in the Atlantic Ocean until a Tuesday in April when I arrived at the Folly Beach Fishing Pier and walked into the Charleston County Parks gift shop at the entrance of the newly rebuilt Folly landmark.

I arrived empty handed—no fishing rod, no bait, not even a fishing license—and within 10 minutes (and \$30 later) I was casting out into the ocean just beyond the surf to start a relaxing day standing directly over the Atlantic Ocean.

Folly Beach has no shortage of things to do but, in my opinion, one of the most unique activities is fishing on the Folly Beach Fishing Pier which juts dramatically out from the shore.

As a Charleston resident for more than 20 years, I had been on my fair share of boats casting lines in our many waterways. But casting a line into the ocean with nothing but the horizon in the background? That was only something I had only seen other people do as I walked past them on scenic strolls down the 1,045-foot-long Folly Beach fishing pier, which reopened in 2022.

I have always been curious about fishing off the pier. When I learned how accessible it was for everyone—that you could rent a rod and buy bait and everything else you may need right there at the gift shop—I added it to my Charleston bucket list.

I'll admit that over the years, the signs I read affixed to the pier regarding fishing and sharks was a bit intimidating: no fishing for them and no "chumming the water" to attract the predators.

While I do have fond memories of lake fishing in Mississippi with a cork and bobber growing up, the snarliest of the fish we'd hook was a small whiskered catfish.

As an ocean fishing newbie, the last thing I wanted to do was come nose-to-nose with a shark. Or a stingray.

This bucket list activity came to fruition on a beautiful April morning, prompted by an email I received from Charleston County Parks about its upcoming schedule of events for the Folly Fishing Pier.

On the schedule for the end of May was the return of the Cast Off Fishing Tournament, a morning of fishing with prizes given in several categories.

Inoted that the Cast Off Fishing Tournament included a kid's contest—surely, fishing off the pier couldn't be that daunting if kids are encouraged to sign up. The email included photos of past tournaments with elementary school children showing off their ocean hauls, which sealed the deal for me.

I packed light—nothing but my wallet and sunscreen—and showed up at the gift shop. A day pass (\$7 for adults; \$4 for



seniors and children, with yearly passes available) covers all-day fishing and takes the place of a fishing license. There's a refundable deposit to rent a rod and it's \$15 to rent it for the day, or you can bring your own. While choosing your rod, you get to see photos of fishermen, some from the 1990s, and their record catches on the wall including black drum, cobia, pompano, King mackerel, Spanish mackerel, flounder and sheepshead.

Common catches off the pier are blue fish, sheepshead, spotted sea trout and whiting.

You can pick your bait from a menu, or you can bring your own. I was persuaded to choose frozen shrimp (\$8) but there is also squid and chicken necks for sale—and I took the to-go container to the pier to find a spot to set up shop.

I could choose any spot on the side of the pier. Left or right, close to the shore or all the way to the diamond-shaped platform at the end. There are shaded options and long, open stretches where you can get plenty of sunshine and tables where you can clean your fish with a connected hose and trashcan for scraps.

The rods they have available to rent are 7-feet-6-inches long and come rigged with weighted double hooks. It was suggested that I cut a shrimp in half and put one half

on the top hook, the other on the bottom. I then cast out into the ocean and saw the line effortlessly glide down to the water from the 22-feet-or-so perch from the top of the pier. I was told that some fishermen claim to have more luck dropping their lines straight down on the pilings

The top of the pier is lined with white fishing rod holders every 15 feet or so, made of PVC piping. If you want more of a handsoff fishing experience, you can cast your line, place the rod in the holder, take a seat on the wooden bench and wait to see if the tip bends towards the water, indicating a fish on the line.

Or, you can hold onto the rod the entire time to try and feel for a bite. With these rods—and with ocean fishing in general—there are no bobbers. The goal is for a fish that's swimming near the bottom of the seafloor to see your bait flowing with the current and chomp on it.

Noah O'Brien, the Folly Beach Pier Operations Manager II, is often outside on the pier excitedly checking out what fishermen bring up to the surface. He reassured me that sharks are generally a rare catch (he said bait should be no more than 2x2x2 inches to attract smaller and more desirable fish). O'Brien said a more recent accidental catch have been sea turtles over the past month, two which were

caught and mended right away with the proper turtle watch groups alerted.

It's OK if you need to cut your line if you catch a shark or stingray or get snagged on the artificial reef near the end of the diamond platform; the gift shop won't charge you the first time. O'Brien said it's a very dramatic scene when a fish is pulled up the tall pier and flops its way to freedom once it gets 20 feet up to the very top.

On the morning of my fishing adventure, I cast my line just past where the surf breaks, placed it in the holder and waited, chatting with O'Brien about fishing in general and keeping birds from stealing the bait—who knew they can use their beaks to pry open a to-go container!

My rod bent towards the water after a few minutes, pointing at whatever was on the line and I eagerly reeled it in. Other fishermen peered over to see what was on the line. My first Atlantic Ocean fish! I already pictured my photo on the wall of the store, adding to the hall of fame.

What happened next was quite surprising. I caught...a snail!?? It was a smaller version of a conch shell—but very much inhabited by a slug-like creature—a slug which had

halfway devoured the shrimp and had been ensnared by the hook.

A lightening whelk? A knobbed whelk?

"I didn't know these were just floating around out there!" I said as O'Brien took the creature off the rod and threw it back. Add that to the exciting things you can catch off the pier that you'd never find in a lake.

While that ended up being the only catch of my hour-long fishing morning, I'd like to say I'm hooked. I never thought that fishing could be so convenient; an all-inclusive activity where you just need to bring yourself and your wallet to start your fishing adventure in no time! I saw fishermen who had packed a lunch and sodas for the afternoon.

O'Brien said regular fisherman quite literally catch their dinner—a thought that makes me smile in the throes of deadlines and other laptop work.

A cold beer from the adjacent restaurant Pier 101 was very tempting post-fishing—especially with their chairs and tall tables overlooking the ocean.

Fishing on the Folly Pier is an activity where you really can't beat the view, no matter how long you stay. Rent a rod for an hour or an entire day. Enjoy sunrise or sunset, or both.

If you need another reason to head out there, fishing in May is a good way to practice for the Cast Off Fishing Tournament set for Saturday, May 25 from 6 a.m.-2 p.m. No need to pre-register; sign up the day of the tournament at the gift shop. Another tournament will be held later in the summer on June 22 from 6 a.m. - 2 p.m.

The tournament will be just like my fishing morning—anyone can sign up and anyone can rent rods—or you can bring your own. The only difference is that the fish caught will be recorded and fishing-related prizes will be up for grabs, like coolers and fishing gear. The winners will almost certainly get their photo taken.

Whether at a tournament or on a random Tuesday morning, fishing off the Folly Beach Fishing Pier is a uniquely Folly Beach activity and thanks to Charleston County Parks, its couldn't be easier to get set up and cast your line. Catching a whelk, that's the hard part.

Tournaments offer awards for the Biggest 3 Fish by Weight, the Biggest Youth Catch (12 and under) and the Best 5 Fish (total weight). Participants are only eligible to win one category. Tournament registration fees are \$12 for ages 13 and up, \$9 for members of the military, \$9 for seniors (60 and up) and ages 12 and under; \$5 for all fishing pass holders. Adult chaperones are required for ages 15 and under. No preregistration is required. On-site registration for tournaments begins the morning of the event. Parking fees are an additional charge at the Folly Pier.

PUBLIC INTOXICATION

The man had a strong odor of alcohol beverage coming from his breath in person as well as glassy and bloodshot eyes. The man had urinated on himself and was unable to tell officers where he was staying. A container of Fireball cinnamon whiskey was recovered from his pocket. The man became angry and threatened officers as they were putting him in handcuffs he began displaying aggressive behavior, kicking officers and threatening to kill them. Officers took him to the ground and the man received a small laceration to his right eyebrow EMS was called to render aid and he was transferred to a local emergency room for treatment before going to jail.


ALCOHOL ON THE BEACH

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


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


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That Sweet Swamp Music

The Harmonica Romp in the Swamp returns to Bowen's Island for 25th installment on May 26

ocal bluesman Andy "Smoky" Weiner has always been good at keeping time. Something essential for a musician. But it also makes sense considering that Weiner attended the Joseph Bulova School of Watchmaking and even owned a jewelry and watch repair shop in downtown Charleston for several years oin the 1990s. And like clockwork, every year he puts on some of the best and longest-running blues and jazz gatherings in the Southeast over the last 25 years. Since 1999, the Sunday before Memorial Day has become a gathering of some of the finest blues musicians from the region and beyond for what has become known as the Harmonica Romp in the Swamp.

"It's a great gig every year," says Weiner, who is bringing the Romp back to Bowen's Island on Sunday, May 26 for its silver jubilee (that's 25 years if you didn't know). In the past, the event has welcomed such blues luminaries as Miss Wanda Johnson and Big Daddy Cade to the Bowen's Island stage.

For the 25th anniversary of the Romp in Swamp, Weiner has assembled an impressive lineup of seasoned blues musicians, including Elliott & the Untouchables, Juke Joint Johnny, Cotton Blue, and, of course, Smoky Weiner. Tickets for the event are \$30 in advance through Eventbrite or \$25 cold cash at the door.

Although he doesn't consider himself

truly a promoter, the former watch repairman-turned-electrician (Handy Andy Electric) has been putting on some of the biggest and best blues events in the Southeast right here along the coast at scenic Bowen's Island. But Weiner's musical journey didn't begin among the piles of oyster shells and dolphins swimming along the marsh. The New York Native moved to Folly Beach in 1987 but he began playing music when he was just 8 years old when his grandmother gave him his first harmonica.

"I was always running around with a harmonica," recalls Weiner. "I really should be a lot better than I am now, considering I've been playing for 60 years."

Always quick with a joke or amusing antidote, Weiner says he grew up playing music with his sister, who had a guitar. They would often play Bob Dylan, Peter, Paul & Mary, Pete Seeger, and other popular folk and rock singers from the day. Weiner actually got to share the stage with the legendary Seegar once upon a time. He also had the privilege of traveling to the Capitol and playing an inauguration reception for President Barrack Obama and an event called the Grits & Granite ball, thrown by the South Carolina Democratic Party and the New Hampshire Democratic Party. He has also played at events for former S.C. Governor and U.S. Congressman Mark Sanford. His band, Smoky Weiner & The Hotlinks, has been a longtime fixture on the Charleston blues circuit. He also helped create and oversaw the Homegrown Blues Series, which was part of Piccolo Spoleto for several years.

These days, he and the Hot Links don't play as often as they used to, but Weiner is still able to tap into his vast network of blues musicians to pull together a couple of great shows every year, the Harmonica Romp in the Swamp and another Bowen's Island event held the Sunday before Labor Day every year.

"People still like the music, but there used to be a whole lot more blues bands around, and there are now far fewer. Not as many places to play now either," Weiner laments. But he and the Harmonica Romp in the Swamp continue to carry the torch for those who love to play and listen to the type of music.

Beyond the great music, this year's Romp will also feature food from Workman's Café just up the road on James Island for purchase as well as a cash bar.

The 25th annual Harmonica Romp in the Swamp will be held Sunday, May 26, from 4-8 p.m. at Bowen's Island Restaurant, located at 1870 Bowens Island Road. To purchase tickets, visit www.eventbrite.com/e/harmonica-rompin-the-swamp-tickets-861172258407.

"We like to fly our drone over the beach and find wildlife whenever we get the chance,"

When discussing the tools of their trade, the Stanfills state they've always been fans of Canon cameras, but have also used Sony products for certain projects. Emily says Sigma is her favorite brand of lenses to use while photographing.

"For weddings, I always use a Sigma 24-70mm ... We have a couple others we trade out for different times and Matt likes to keep shoots simple with a 'Nifty fifty' for video," she says.


According to Emily, most of their clients find their business through Facebook or word of mouth.


"This industry can be hard," says Emily. "The photography market is super saturated, and it can be difficult for people like us who are so young when this is our full-time job."


She also admits that living on the road can be tough at times, but she believes that the benefits of their nomadic lifestyle still outweigh the challenges.



That's a Stretch!

Alfredo's on Folly dives into the art of cheesemaking with private mozzarella classes

ozzarella is one of the main pillars of Italian cuisine. It's in everything from lasagna to pizza, arancini to eggplant parmesan, calzones to caprese salad. Yet, lots of people make their own marinara or alfredo sauces, some even make their own pasta, but very few make their own mozzarella. Most haven't even considered it or perhaps didn't even know you could. Isn't cheesemaking some ancient art that requires lots of time, optimum conditions, and a cave or something?

No, not mozzarella, explains Michael Scognamiglio, owner and executive chef of Alfredo's on Folly. And it's surprisingly doable to make yourself once you know how to do it properly. And he's now offering classes at the restaurant to teach you how.

"I was taught that to truly enjoy "fresh" mozzarella it should be eaten within 24 hours," says Scognamiglio. "Just think of how long ago store-bought 'fresh' mozzarella has been made by the time you bring it home from the store. And in the class, you can taste the difference."

Before opening Alfredo's on Folly, Scognamiglio was the owner and executive chef of the popular Italian restaurant Bacco in Mount Pleasant, where he occasionally would teach mozzarella classes.

"They were always fun for the guests and myself," he says. "Also, I just realized how many families and large groups of vacationers come to Folly, so I figured something like this could be a fun activity for groups coming onto the island. It's something different from the typical Beach and River excursion experiences that already exist."

"It's such an important cheese in Italy, known throughout the country. But taken most seriously in the Campania region around the city of Naples where it's from," says Scognamiglio, who has family roots to that region. "Italian cooking is so regional that, for the most part, ingredients that are close to you dictate what dishes you produce."

For example, the island of Capri, which is located off of Naples is where you find mozzarella in the Caprese Salad, hence the name, Scognamiglio explains. Just on the mainland in Sorrento you find Pasta Sorrentina, which is a baked pasta dish topped with it. And, of course, the most famous dish that comes out of that area using mozzarella is pizza, which is Scognamiglio's favorite use of the cheese.

"I'm a huge Neapolitan pizza fan. aimple margarita pizza is all it takes for me," he

Scognamiglio says he's been teaching 1-3 classes per week since he started doing them a little over a month ago. Each private class usually has between six and eight people, but he recently did one for 13. The cost is \$60 per person (with a minimum of six people). In each class, Scognamiglio gives a brief description of how the cheese is made, some information about the differences and variations of the cheese, and also a hands-on session of how to pull and make it yourself. Afterward, he personally prepares a twocourse lunch with dishes that include mozzarella, of course. Typically, classes run between 1.5-2 hours long.

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

t's a perfect time to be fishing! Our waters are now full of bait and fish are actively eating. All summer seasonal species have arrived and when added to our traditional gamefish, provide a whole array of options for an angler. If you haven't started fishing yet, let's get going!

Consider making the most of live bait when focusing on redfish. Menhaden are a great choice whether fished cut or alive. We've been catching some nice redfish by casting chunks of menhaden under docks. You'll need to use enough weight to hold your bait steady so it doesn't slide around on the bottom and get snagged. I use pinch-on split shot that can be easily changed, just add or remove these weights as needed.

Topwater trout action is abundant at first light! Heddon's Super Spook Jr. in their silver mullet color works great but

my go-to is the chartreuse and black. Vary retrieve speeds as you work these lures along grassy banks and over shell rakes. When a fish strikes, reel quickly before raising your rod tip. Hard to do sometimes when a violent explosion erupts around your lure! Once the topwater bite starts to fade, suspended twitch bait lures are a good choice to continue the fun.

Sharks have filled our waters with multiple species like bonnetheads, black tips, and sharpnose, which are all easily accessible. You'll start to see the fins of sharks as they cruise along river banks and also find them feasting along drop offs in the harbor and inlets. Blue crab, live shrimp and cut bait all work well on these predators. I favor 7/0 circle hooks. Just put the rods in the holders and wait for them to whip over!



Turtle Nesting Season Is Upon Us

ravid loggerhead turtles historically begin making nests on Folly Island the first week of May. The "citizen scientist" Folly Turtle Watch folks (a.k.a. the turtle ladies) have already begun their predawn beach surveys. They continue these patrols until nesting season ends in October.

These volunteers document all observable sea turtle nesting activity. They detail successful nests and false crawls. A false crawl occurs when a female turtle crawls up the beach, but then returns to the ocean without nesting. They move nests when necessary. Once the nests hatch, they calculate hatch rates and collect eggshells for DNA analysis.

Almost all sea turtle nests on Folly Island (and other South Carolina beaches) are made by loggerheads. Occasionally, other species such as green turtles or leatherbacks make their nests on the island.

Increased turtle nesting rates along Southeastern shorelines correlate strongly with the use of Turtle Excluder Devices (TED) in commercial shrimp nets. After much haggling, litigation, and testing, TEDs

were made mandatory in July of 1989. Turtle mortality immediately decreased.


A TED, a metal grate sewn into a shrimp net, prevents turtles and other large animals from getting trapped (97% success rate) but lets the shrimp pass into the net pocket (or cod-end).

When hatched turtles emerge from their nest, they scurry to the ocean, then make a frenzied swim toward the Gulf Stream. Once there, the North Atlantic Gyre sweeps them around the Sargasso Sea, east to the Canary and Cape Verde islands. Twenty or so years later, females return to lay eggs on land near their natal origin. Male turtles never return to land.

Brian Shamblin, an associate research scientist with the University of Georgia's Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources, began extracting DNA samples from spent turtle shells in 2006.

In 2010, Shamblin, partnering with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, the South Carolina, and Georgia Departments of Natural Resources, and the University of Georgia, formed the Northern Recovery Unit Loggerhead DNA Project. Turtle Watch programs, such as on Folly Island, make this DNA analysis possible.

With DNA analysis, eggs are matched to individual "mama" turtles to determine nesting frequencies, occurrences, and locations. From these data, biologists have learned that individual turtles nest multiple times per season (up to 8), and that they nest in multiple locations. Some turtles make all



their seasonal nests within a few miles of each other. Others make seasonal nests up to 500 miles apart.

University of North Carolina Wilmington biologists Joanne Halls and Alyssa Randall have studied loggerhead turtle false crawl to nesting ratios. Their studies indicate a higher rate of false crawls on developed and renourished beaches when compared to undeveloped beaches. With Folly's beach renourishment in full swing all summer, expect a higher false crawl to nesting ratio. Historical data shows lower nesting rates during renourishments as well. According to nesting records, turtles prefer natural

beaches/ beach profiles over unnatural freshy-renourished beaches with scarped tidelines. A renourished beach will take a year or more until waves re-establish a (natural) equilibrium beach profile.

While this turtle season may produce less nests than normal due to the renourishment, biologists at UNCW and SCDNR (and the Folly Turtle Watch program's own data) indicate a rebound in nesting rates a year or two after renourishment.






